Gale dedicated 28 years to teaching in the music department until January 2023. Gale not only taught but also engaged in professional work out of state. During summers, she dedicated herself to theater productions, showcasing her passion for the arts beyond her academic duties.

After surveying various musical options, Gale decided to do "Godspell," driven by her aspiration to emphasize community and inclusivity.
